Dairy producer, Lactalis South Africa (SA) has invested R140m in a new evaporator dryer powder plant facility at its cheese manufacturing plant in Bonnievale in the Western Cape. Lactalis South Africa's Bonnievale factory is one of the biggest cheese factories on the African continent and currently employs 800 employees.

The purpose of the evaporator dryer plant is to efficiently remove water from milk to produce a dry powder that has a longer shelf life, is easily transportable and can be used in a variety of applications. The drying process is carefully controlled to ensure that the dried milk powder is of high quality and standard.

MEC for economic development for the Western Cape, Mireille Wenger says that South Africa and especially the Western Cape, is brimming with possibility. But the key to unlocking this potential lies in the actions taken to enable and support investments and businesses like Lactalis South Africa.
